In February 2019, I discovered Young Roots, a charity providing immediate & long-term support to child refugees in the UK, through its patron, the actor Juliet Stevenson. I was so moved by the work that it does that I swore to her that I would find a way to raise money for it. I had no idea how.

I'd read the true story *In The Sea There Are*Crocodiles some years earlier, and it haunted me ever after. I'd read how, at the age of ten, Enaiat Akbari's village fell prey to the Taliban; how, fearing for his life, Enaiat's mother (in an act of astonishing courage and maternal sacrifice) led him across the border where she left him, alone, to fend for himself. I'd read about Enaiat's five-year ordeal: traversing bitterly cold mountains, near-suffocating in the base of a truck, steering an inflatable raft in violent seas. I'd marvelled how that young boy crossed Pakistan, Iran, Turkey, and Greece - discovering brotherhood, witnessing death, and losing everything but hope - before arriving in Italy, aged fifteen.

In August 2019, while on holiday, it hit me: the book would make an incredible play, and the play could be the fundraiser. I sent the book to the renowned youth theatre director Nicola Moran, and asked if we could meet over tea in a café in September. She agreed. Before we'd even ordered tea, she said, "This would make a brilliant play." I said, "I know. I'm going to produce it; you're going to write it." She said, "But you're the author; you should write it." I said, "No way. I've just written a novel. I'm knackered. And you've done adaptations before and they are fantastic. You are the one." She said, "Have you ever produced a play before?" I said, "No, but I love a challenge."

We began work, right there and then in the cafe. Three months later, LoudonMoranProductions was formed, we'd bought the UK theatre rights to the book, Nicola adapted it into the play, we cast some wonderful young actors, booked professional theatres, and I started fund-raising for the considerable production costs.

Then, the pandemic struck. However, we were determined, and determined not to let people down. We didn't cancel. We postponed the planned Autumn 2020 tour, and later rearranged it from scratch, admittedly with the sad loss of five professional venues in the process, whose scheduling had been rendered chaotic by repeated lockdowns. Nonetheless, with huge efforts all round, we did it. I sincerely hope those efforts will richly reward you, our audience, with an experience that we are, at last, so glad to share with you.

How I wish the play were fiction. How I wish it were not more relevant now than ever before. Our 21-year-old Afghan composer, Arson Fahim, is a former refugee himself and just as our cast went into rehearsals, he left Afghanistan for the US, to take up a prestigious scholarship to a music conservatoire. It could be the greatest adventure of his life. A fortnight after his arrival, Afghanistan was taken over by the Taliban. Arson is a long way from home. He is a long way from his family, who are in hiding. It should not be this way for anyone. It is appalling that it is.

In the Sea There Are Crocodiles is one child's epic tale of hope and survival. As unaccompanied children around the world continue daily to seek asylum, and as the people of Afghanistan in particular suffer in ways that few of us can even imagine, this is a tale that is lived by children just like ours, every single day.

Producer

Mary Loudon is the bestselling author of five books of non-fiction and fiction, published in the UK, USA, Canada, Australia, South Africa, France, Germany, Holland, Italy, Portugal and Norway. She has also contributed essays and poetry to six anthologies. An experienced public speaker, Mary has chaired and taken part in many public discussions, and has made over 200 radio and TV appearances. She has been a judge for the Whitbread Prize & Costa Book Awards. Mary has won four writer's prizes, as well as being short-listed for *MIND Book of the Year* and long-listed for *Richard & Judy Book of The Year*. Her recent novel, *My House Is Falling Down*, is being adapted for stage in 2022.



Nicola Moran

Director

Nicola Moran trained at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, where she graduated with a First Class Honours degree in Acting and was presented with the finalists' gold medal for outstanding achievement. She performed on screen & stage for many years before starting her own drama academy. With a very strong interest in cultivating young talent, Nicola focuses on developing the acting skills of children of all ages, and her students have had many successes at UK drama festivals. She also coaches students preparing for LAMDA exams. Nicola has written, adapted & directed numerous plays including DNA, Kindertransport, Jane Eyre, & Evacuees. She is on the Board of Trustees of the Pegasus Theatre in Oxford.



Arson Fahim

Composer

Arson Fahim is a 21-year-old pianist, composer and conductor from Afghanistan. Born a refugee, in a Pakistan camp for displaced Afghans, his father worked in the camp as a teacher. However, money was so scarce that when Arson was three, his parents placed him in an orphanage 90 miles away, in the hope that he would receive a good education. There he remained until he was twelve, when the family reunited and returned finally to Kabul. It was there, in a children's learning centre, that Arson saw a piano for the first time. It was being played: a piano teacher was giving a lesson to another child; but he let Arson come to the piano and touch it, key by key. Later that day, Arson received his first lesson.

Arson graduated from the Afghanistan National Institute of Music - where he was the conductor

of the Afghanistan National Symphony Orchestra - in 2021. It is a perilous position to hold: musicians are Taliban targets. During one student concert that Arson missed because he was ill, a suicide bomber attacked the school, killing an audience member.

Arson began to play his own compositions dedicated to people killed in the ongoing conflict in Afghanistan. In 2020, the South Asian Symphony Foundation selected him as its ambassador for peace.

Arson is currently studying piano performance at the Longy School of Music in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He arrived in the US just two weeks before the recent Taliban takeover. His family is in hiding in Kabul.

Young Roots works with young refugees aged 11-25, supporting them to improve their wellbeing and fulfil their potential, through intensive 1:1 Casework, weekly youth and sporting activities, English language mentoring, youth leadership and access to expert therapeutic and legal advice.

IN SUPPORT OF

Young Roots supports around 650 young refugees and asylum seekers each year, the majority of whom are without their families and particularly isolated. Most have not arrived in the UK through safe routes and have experienced severe trauma.

We recognise the huge potential and remarkable resilience of the young people we support. Our approach is informed by the needs and wishes of each individual and the trusted relationships we build ensure they feel able and ready to access the support they need. Young people often describe us as a 'second family'.



Anjarut's Story

I have been coming to Young Roots since 2017, after Social Services disputed my age and I was moved out of young person's housing and into a hostel.

I was really sad about my experiences in Afghanistan and enroute to the UK, especially in the Calais Jungle. My bad living situation made me feel worse about the things I had experienced.

With Young Roots' support, I have achieved a lot. I have got my papers, I have learned English, I have made friends, I have got my driving license, I am going to college, I have a travel document, I had a good solicitor who helped me to win my case and can help me again. I still feel a bit sad about things in my life, but it is better than when I first arrived. I still miss my family.
